Time for Creativity

The unit theme we will explore this month is Shadows and Reflections. The Reggio-inspired activities that we will participate as a group include body shadows, color shadows, mirrors, water, and crystals. We will use mirrors to draw our reflections. From this we will learn about what a reflection is and how we can view ourselves and the world around us using a reflection. We will learn about symmetry. That one side of a figure plus its mirror image should look like the original image. We also will learn new vocabulary - axis of symmetry (a line that separates the picture into two equal halves).

Learning through Play

Q: Where do worms go in the winter?

A: Students learned that worms hibernate. When the ground gets cold during winter, worms dig down into the soil where it is warmer. That warm soil acts like a blanket to keep them warm. As the ground warms and the soil loosens, they make their way back to the surface.

Q: How can snakes hear if they don't have ears?

A: Students learned that snakes don't have ears, but have a "tool" inside their head that is attached to their jaw bones that help them hear. This "tool" helps them hear sounds that are low and sense vibrations on the ground.
