**SPENDING IN THE SHADOWS: NONSPECIFIC FUNDING IN THE FY 2017
NEW YORK STATE ENACTED BUDGET**

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I. Overview and Introduction

New Yorkers expect that when the Governor and legislative leaders announce that a state budget has been agreed upon it represents a carefully itemized plan for spending taxpayer dollars. However, the New York State budget, certainly in the past few years, has largely been a framework with significant spending unresolved or unspecified.

Since 2013, Citizens Union has issued a report entitled *Spending in the Shadows*, which has identified pots of money in New York’s Executive and final Enacted budgets for which the budget defers specific spending decisions, leaving them to one or more elected officials to make at some point in the future. The fiscal year (FY) 2017 Enacted Budget contains nearly \$4.8 billion of such opaque “lump sum funds,” which explicitly allocate nonspecific funding for general purposes. These pots of lump sum funds allow detailed spending decisions to be made in the shadows by elected state officials after the budget is adopted. When decisions are made about how to specifically spend the money, the expenditures often come with no explanation of how the funds will be specifically used and no accountable reporting to the public on how the funds are spent.

This figure of \$4.8 billion comes from 84 separate pots of money in the FY 2017 Enacted Budget and is *double* the amount of lump sum funds over the \$2.4 billion included in the FY 2017 proposed Executive Budget. It is also a 65% increase of \$1.9 billion over last year’s Enacted Budget in which identifiable lump sum funds totalled \$2.9 billion from 95 separate pots.¹ The last two Enacted budgets show these pots totalled \$2.9 billion (FY 2016) and \$3.8 billion (FY 2015). FY 2106 identifiable lump sum pots is even \$1 billion more than two years ago.

Past Citizens Union (CU) *Spending in the Shadows* reports have focused solely on these lump sum pots that are to be spent at the direction of one or more elected officials. However, these pots merely represent the tip of the iceberg of unspecified funding pots under state government control that have few restraints on the specific decisions that can be made by elected officials and little public accountability for how the funds are spent. This report identifies a number of additional nonspecific funding pots where no official is explicitly cited as having control, but which are clearly opportunities for elected officials to exercise authority over funds.

These funds represent an additional \$14.2 billion. The sum of these funds, plus the \$4.8 billion noted in the above paragraph, **amount to \$19 billion in nonspecific funding that is available to elected officials** with no more than general parameters, little or no explanation of the spending process, and that are spent largely without public accountability.²

We also note two additional sizeable sources of funds that may provide substantial leeway for elected officials to designate how those funds are spent: funds held by public authorities and Public Safety and Emergency Response funding.

The continued existence of many billions of taxpayer dollars in such funds is of particular concern in the wake of the conviction and sentencing of the immediate past Speaker of the Assembly and Senate Majority Leader for crimes of corruption related to the increasingly large and obscene role money plays in our state's political and funding decisions as part of Albany's transactional "pay-to-play" culture. This area of funding is particularly relevant since Silver's conviction was based in part on the misappropriation of funds such as these. The ongoing state and federal investigations into contracting irregularities that resulted in the indictment of two state officials and one ally to the Governor shows just how little accountability and public scrutiny there is when elected officials are given great discretion in awarding contracts from nonspecific funds.³

Reform of the budget and funding decision process is crucial to restoring some partial public confidence in our elected officials, as polls show the electorate believes almost to a person, that the corruption in New York state government is a serious problem.⁴ Citizens Union urges enactment of a series of necessary reforms, set forth on page 9, designed to greatly improve budgeting accountability by our elected officials.

II. Known Lump Sum Funds Explicitly Subject to Specific Decisions by Elected Officials

In February, 2016, CU issued its third annual *Spending in the Shadows* report, finding \$2.4 billion in lump sum funds in the FY 2016-17 Executive Budget, which would be explicitly subject to

specific funding decisions by one or more individual elected officials. CU has determined that an additional \$2.4 billion of such funds were added in the FY2017 Enacted Budget. Thirteen new pots were added to the enacted Aid to Localities and Capital budgets, totalling \$92 million. No such new lump sum pots were included in the FY2017 Executive Budget from the prior year’s (FY2016) Enacted Budget.

In addition to the aforementioned \$92 million, two appropriations concerning a multi-year housing program totalling \$1.97 billion, which had been in the Executive Capital Budget, now provide that the funds shall be allocated pursuant to a memorandum of understanding between the Assembly Speaker, Temporary President of the Senate (who is the Majority Leader), and the Director of the Budget (who, of course, speaks for the Governor).

Further additions to the Enacted Budget include a provision added to legislation accompanying the budget, which permits the Comptroller to transfer up to \$21 million to the Community Projects Fund, at the request of the Director of the Budget, where the Director receives a request in writing from one or both houses of the Legislature. We note that this \$21 million item is in addition to the \$157 million in reappropriations from the Community Projects Fund – long a behind-the-scenes source of funding for projects sought by specific elected officials. Finally, there are a number of other adjustments, including 15 reappropriations from prior years which were not included in the Executive Budget but which are in the Enacted Budget, a reappropriation deleted from the Executive Budget and specific allocations added to two small appropriations which were lump sum pots in the Executive Budget. The changes outlined above can be found in Table A.

A breakdown of the Enacted Budget lump sum pots subject to explicit control by elected officials is as follows:

Of the nearly \$4.8 billion in lump sum funds, \$3.3 billion represents spending which will involve consent from, or consultation with, one or both houses of the Legislature or legislative leaders, and \$81,500,000 is to be spent pursuant to a plan developed by the Attorney General. \$1.4 billion represents funds in the SUNY 2020 or CUNY 2020 Challenge Grant Program, which will be

allocated subject to approval of a plan by the Governor and the respective chancellor; 84% of the SUNY/CUNY funding is allocated to SUNY. \$110 million of SUNY/CUNY funding is new in the Enacted Budget.

The officials who will determine how the lump sums are expended are as follows:

The lump sum funds under the control of one or more elected officials can be found in 84 separate budget pots, including 55 in the Aid to Localities Budget, 28 in the Capital Budget, and one in an accompanying Article VII bill. These are set forth in the appendix to this report.

This analysis does not include \$25 million in newly appropriated FY 2017 funds (not included in the Executive Budget) for the Empire State Poverty Reduction Initiative. Under this initiative, organizations in certain localities are to receive funding, with decisions being made by the mayors or borough presidents of those localities. It also does not include two appropriations clearly under the control of one or more elected leaders, but for which it could not be determined precisely how much was available because the particular appropriation was part of larger prior-year appropriations which were mostly spent.⁷ We believe the remaining amounts would not materially change the above presentation.

III. Additional Lump Sum Funds with No Specificity

The \$4.8 billion in funds discussed above are **only a portion of the unspecified lump sum funds in the Enacted Budget**. Many other funding pots do not specify consultation with, or approval by, elected officials, but nevertheless are presented in the budget as large sums (often hundreds of millions or more) with little instruction beyond the general topic as to how the funds are to be spent. These funds allow elected and/or government officials to dole out monies at their discretion, and while the funds may be spent for a public purpose, they can also be allocated to enhance political power, and as we have seen in the case of Sheldon Silver, the personal wealth of those officials. The funds can be used to reward supporters, punish opponents, or enrich friends and family members. Particularly given the vast sums involved, the lack of accountability can sow seeds of distrust, and that distrust is certainly pervasive among the electorate. Below are several examples.

A. State and Municipal Facilities Program

Approximately \$1.5 billion in funds is authorized for the State and Municipal Facilities Program Fund, including \$385 million in new appropriations for FY 2017. According to news reports, spending from this fund has been driven, at least to some extent, by legislators, and indeed Project Information Forms requesting funding are submitted by legislators (many such forms are posted on the Senate and Assembly websites).⁸ However, there is no public accounting of how decisions are made regarding the spending of those funds, or who is making those decisions.

B. Transformative Investment Program

Another Capital Budget fund reportedly manipulated by legislators is the Transformative Investment Program (TIF). This \$400 million fund is to be devoted to “regionally significant economic development initiatives that create or retain private-sector jobs” in New York City and on Long Island. The TIF was placed in the budget last year at the initiative of then-Majority Leader Skelos, and the appropriation includes no requirements on how it is to be spent or whether or how the spending is to be reported (some projects are set forth in the budget but the Budget Director has the authority to move the funds to other “projects with a common purpose”). Indeed, there was a news report that funding for a project originally slated from the TIF fund was drawn from another discretionary pot when the Senate complained that the TIF was to be set aside for other projects, with Senate involvement in decision-making. The decision was made by Public Authorities Control Board, which consists of representatives of the Governor and legislative leaders, and which

operates in relative obscurity. Pending resolutions before the Board are not made available, but results of the voting are posted.⁹

C. Settlement Proceeds and the Dedicated Infrastructure Investment Fund

During the two most recent fiscal years, New York State has received \$8.5 billion in funds resulting from settlements of lawsuits brought against financial institutions as a result of the 2008 crisis. Most of those funds were placed in the Dedicated Infrastructure Investment Fund (DIIF), created by 2014 legislation.¹⁰ According to the Comptroller, all but approximately \$555 million has been allocated to specific projects.¹¹ However, Section 93-B of the state Finance Law, which created the DIIF, permits DIIF funds to be used for “projects, works, activities or purposes necessary to support state-wide investments as appropriated by the Legislature.” It also provides that “nothing contained in this section shall be construed to limit in any way the projects, works, activities or purposes that can be financed from this account, including but not limited to loans to public corporations or under terms approved by the director of the budget.” The substantial amount of money that has accrued to New York through these settlements, plus the nonspecific spending criteria of the DIIF, raise serious concerns about how spending decisions are made regarding these funds and how New York’s leaders can be held accountable for those decisions.

D. Various Economic Development Programs

There are many other lump sum funds with no instructions as to who allocates the monies or how, and which also lack spending criteria. For example, the Capital Budget contains a number of funds dedicated to economic development projects. Most of these involve reappropriation from earlier years, but are still pots of money that can be spent without oversight. In light of the current investigation into spending decisions from economic development-related funds by Executive Branch employees, the size of these funds and lack of accountability should be of particular concern. Many of the state’s economic development programs have been mentioned above, but those are far from inclusive. A partial list of other economic development funds and the amounts included (totalling \$3.8 billion) in the FY 2017 budget are as follows:

IV. The Sum of All These Pots

Tabulating the sum of the funds referenced in this report, **\$27 billion are available for use without rigorous criteria or effective public accountability**, as follows:

V. Additional Funds Susceptible to Influence by Elected Officials

A. Funds Controlled by Public Authorities

In addition to funds under direct control of the state government, there are numerous additional pots of money maintained by public authorities created by the state government which are by law considered independent entities. As a practical matter, however, the boards of the authorities are appointed largely by the Governor and are, at the least, attentive, if not responsive, to the wishes of the Governor. An examination of the 325 identified state level authorities and subsidiaries¹² and the funds they maintain and expend at the behest of the Governor are beyond the scope of this report, but we provide two brief examples to show the huge additional pots of state controlled money that exist under the influence, if not the direction, of the Governor, by virtue of his appointing authority of the boards of directors.

The **New York State Energy Research and Development Authority**, according to its website, is a public benefit corporation that offers information, programs, advice and funding to help New Yorkers increase energy efficiency and use renewable energy in a cost-effective way. As of the end of FY 2016, NYSERDA had a balance (“total net position”) of over \$1.6 billion.¹³ A subsidiary of NYSERDA, Green Bank, works with the private sector to increase investments into the state’s clean energy markets. Green Bank had \$212 million as of the end of FY 2015-16, separate from the NYSERDA funds. Green Bank recently was involved in a \$75 million agreement between Bank of America Merrill Lynch and Energy Improvement Corporation (EIC), in which Green Bank provided

credit to EIC. Green Bank also has invested in several solar panel companies and leveraged other clean energy-related private investment. The Governor appoints all of the NYSERDA board, and the NYSERDA statute provides the Governor with veto power over all of the NYSERDA board's actions.

Another telling example is the **New York Power Authority (NYPA)**, which according to its website is "America's largest state power organization, with 16 generating facilities and more than 1,400 circuit-miles of transmission lines."¹⁴ As of December 31, 2015, NYPA's "net position" was \$4.059 billion.¹⁵ The trustees are again appointed by the Governor. In the FY 2017 state budget, control of New York's canals was transferred from the Thruway Authority to the Power Authority (NYPA), even though the connection between canals and the mission of the NYPA is tenuous at best (total canal expenses amounted to \$54 million in FY 2016).

B. Public Safety and Emergency Response

In addition to all these lump sum funds, \$8 billion remains in the State Operations Budget for Public Security and Emergency Response, to address the impact of Superstorm Sandy and to mitigate the impact of future natural disasters. Payments from this fund, much of which came from the federal government, can be made to local governments, public authorities, businesses, not-for-profit organizations, and individuals. There are no further criteria for how the funds are to be spent, though there may be criteria for some of this potential spending that are imposed by the federal government. In this instance, there are curious reporting requirements. The Budget Director is to report to the chairs of the Senate Finance and Assembly Ways & Means Committees, on a monthly basis, the aggregate amount spent from this \$8 billion fund. With regard only to transfers of funds to a state department, agency or authority, the Budget Director or the receiving agency is to provide those chairs with a description of the program or purpose to be funded and the guidelines for accessing or distributing the funding. No other reporting is required, despite the wide breadth of the program.

VI. Conclusion

The net result is an enormous amount of nonspecific state funding which is often only outlined in the budget in broad general categories in which the actual decisions of specific allotments for various projects and programs are left to the input and discretion of elected officials with little accountability and even less public scrutiny. This report has identified \$4.8 billion in nonspecific funds that are explicitly subject to funding decisions by individual elected officials, and an additional \$14.2 billion in other nonspecific funds that are subject to influence by elected officials, totaling \$19 billion unspecified funds in the FY 2017 Enacted Budget. These nonspecific lump sum funds are subject to misuse, as has been shown by the indictments and convictions of high ranking officials and legislative leaders to which we have unfortunately become accustomed. CU does not contest that these funds can potentially be put to vital use in service to the residents

and businesses of New York, but they must be more transparent as to how their money is spent so transparency and public accountability are ensured.

VII. What Needs To Be Done

The sheer volume of lump sum appropriations in the state Enacted Budget, with over \$2 billion added this year alone, should raise alarms for a state government that is crippled by corruption and overpowering pay-to-play culture. The potential for misuse is enormous. Blatant illegal behavior is only one problem, and the fact that 33 legislators since the year 2000 have left office under the cloud of corruption or misconduct shows illegal and unethical behavior in the Legislature and the Executive Branch is well beyond sporadic. However, perhaps an even greater problem is the possibility, and, many perceive, the likelihood that those who contribute money to elected officials can be amply rewarded through receiving government funds outside of competitive bidding processes or other procedures designed to hold government accountable. This undermines the core principle that public funds should be spent so as to maximize the public interest.

We recognize that government needs some amount of discretion in how it manages budgeted funds to respond not only to emergencies, but also to the many unanticipated developments occurring during any fiscal year. However, that should not absolve the Legislature and Governor from developing criteria to guide disbursements, and setting them forth in law. Further, the expenditure of government funds, particularly those from lump sum appropriations, should be reported to the public in detail and in an easily accessible manner. Anything less invites continued skepticism by New Yorkers as to whether their elected officials serve the public or their own needs. This taints the huge majority of elected officials who sought public office with the strong desire to make New York a better place.

We believe enactment of a rigorous set of reforms will lift the cloud over how the government handles the people's money.

WE STRONGLY RECOMMEND OUR STATE GOVERNMENT LEADERS TAKE THE FOLLOWING ACTIONS:

- 1. The state budget should identify all lump sum appropriations upfront, both those identified with an elected official and those that are not.**
- 2. The state budget should disclose the detailed purposes and criteria for the distribution of any lump sum appropriations and reappropriations.**
- 3. Elected officials who seek to make awards from lump sum appropriations or reappropriations should affirm that the contract or grant is for a lawful, public purpose, that the lawmaker has not and will not receive any financial benefit, that there are no conflicts of interest, and that the elected official is in compliance with all financial disclosure requirements in the public officers law.**

Language requiring this of legislators was included in Governor Cuomo's 2015 Capital Budget 30-day amendments, but was not included in the final Enacted Budget that year nor in the FY 2016 or 2017 budgets, despite the convictions of Sheldon Silver and Dean Skelos for manipulating lump sum appropriations for their personal benefit. **This affirmation should be required of elected officials for each individual pot which they influence, and should be codified for all discretionary lump sums via the state finance law.**

4. **All grants and contracts expended under lump sum funds should receive comprehensive, online disclosure.** The disclosure should be in a user-friendly, machine-readable format permitting independent analysis and should include all MOUs, plans, resolutions and other agreements, funds distributed, and the identity of recipients, elected sponsors, and the amount of funds that remain.
5. For lump sum funds distributed via Assembly or Senate resolution, **resolutions should age for three days and identify the legislative sponsor for individual items.**
 - a. Similarly, for **any member items included as line items in the state budget, legislative sponsors should be identified in the budget bills** next to their sponsored items.
6. **There should be a time limit for the reappropriation of lump-sums** to decrease slush funds and the use of such funds as "one-shot" budget gap fillers.
