

In Japan, they will visit distinguished temples, historic museums and monuments, trendy shops, traditional restaurants and walk world-famous neighborhoods like Harajuku and Ginza.

On the itinerary is the new Sky Tree, a gigantic monument which will hover over the Tokyo Tower and is expected to open to the public next year. CCNY Unveils Community Art Gallery November 14 Highlighting PS 129 Student Artists

Artists in Harlem and other Upper Manhattan neighborhoods are getting new space to display their work. The City College of New York will open its new community art gallery 5:30 p.m. Monday, November 14. In addition, the first in a monthly series of “art on the wall” projection exhibits will debut that day, as well.

Dubbed “*Windows on Amsterdam*,” the new gallery is located in CCNY’s North Academic Center (NAC) plaza, at Amsterdam Avenue by West 136th Street. It will be made available to local artists and will also present college exhibits.

The first exhibit, “*The World Around City College: Celebrating Hamilton Heights*,” runs through December 15, 2011. It highlights student drawings from nearby John H. Finley School (PS 129) and photographs taken by CCNY freshmen. Linda L. Carlson, deputy and Fulbright program advisor, City College Office of Undergraduate Studies, curates the exhibit.

The exhibit’s theme was inspired by the 2007 book “*The World in a City: Traveling the Globe Through the Neighborhoods of the New York*,” by Joseph Berger. Mr. Berger, a 1966 City College graduate, is a columnist for “*The New York Times*.”

“*Harlem in the City*,” the initial projection exhibit, features the work of CCNY and community artists. Works for this show come from Harlem School of the Arts, Dwyer Cultural Center, Harlem Arts Alliance, Hamilton Landmark Galleries, Weusi Artist Collective and “Klatsch,” a CCNY student art magazine.

Mott Hall HS & Mayor Bloomberg Plants A Pin Oak Tree

On October 18, 2011 Mayor Bloomberg and the students of Mott Hall High School celebrated the halfway mark of the MillionTreesNYC initiative by planting the 500,000th tree, a Pin Oak, at Saint Nicholas Park in Harlem.

Teacher Maritza Santana and Paraprofessional Richard Williams joined the mayor and Knick star Carmelo Anthony in the celebration of the event and the students learned about the importance of planting and caring for trees in our city.

“Our students were very enthusiastic about participating in the program. As a teacher I was glad to see the students internalize the event with connection to classroom curriculum.” said Ms. Santana.

Principal Ms. Villalona states “We look forward to working with Shalini Beath, Deputy Director of MillionTreesNYC to provide additional opportunities for our students to establish links between the schools’ natural science curriculum and other City initiatives.

The projected shows, which change monthly, will be on display the second and third weeks of each month from 6 p.m. to 12 midnight, seven days a week.

Dr. Myrah Brown Green, CCNY executive director of arts and culture, said the gallery and “art on the wall” series are part of the College’s ongoing initiative to forge stronger community ties through the arts.

“This endeavor is supported by the office of City College President Lisa S. Coico and is part of her ongoing initiative to bring this institution even closer to the community and cement our ties in different spheres, including the arts,” Dr. Green, a renowned artist and master quilt maker, added. Additional support was provided CCNY’s Arts and Cultural program in the Office of Government and Community Affairs.

**The Salad Bar at Lunch Time:
A Fun Fix or A Flop?**



The students enjoy being able to serve themselves, therefore having control over their portion size, choice of vegetables and choice of dressing. Some fourth graders suggested that they would recommend alternating to a "fruit salad" bar on certain days to add variety to the healthy options.



As a new school year begun many of the students at P.S. 92 were "WOWED" by the improvements and additions that were made to the salad bar. When surveyed, 90% of fourth graders said they like the idea of having healthy options during lunch. However, only 60% said that they actually choose to eat salad every day of the week.
