Barnwell School District 45 takes pride in the progress and accomplishments achieved by the combined efforts of its five member Board of Trustees, its dedicated employees, its hardworking students and supportive parents, and its engaged community. An AdvancEd accredited school district, rigorous instruction is delivered through well researched, proven teaching strategies providing challenging opportunities daily. These methods have proven successful, as evidenced by the rise in State test scores in three out of our four schools in the 2013-14 school year. Additionally, our SAT composite score is above the State and National averages, and complete on the ACT as is our four year high school graduation rate.

In our on-going journey to excellence, we will continue to provide new, innovative programs to support the academic development of our students. The Barnwell 45 Summer Reading Camp for third graders was featured in a special on ETV and used as a model for the implementation of Summer Reading Camps statewide. Barnwell Primary School and Barnwell Elementary School continue to increase literacy excellence within the primary and elementary classrooms. This includes implementing Fountas and Pinnell's Benchmarking System for Reading Progress Monitoring in grades Kindergarten through Sixth Grade, utilizing Istation as a comprehensive e-learning program, and implementing an innovative literacy outreach program for at-risk students. Guinyard-Butler Middle School has created a detailed plan for targeting those students who continue to need reading and math support in middle grades. Barnwell High School continues to focus efforts on improving student achievement and the graduation rate by offering after-school programs which target students struggling in core academic areas. These efforts include, but are not limited to, technology-based remediation software and individualizing student scheduling needs.

Increasing success within our schools requires a collaborative and concentrated effort by many stakeholders. In Barnwell 45, we make concerted efforts to include all stakeholders in planning, executing, and reflecting upon the district's goals and activities. We have a curriculum and supervision team made up of school and district leaders that serve as catalysts for changes that positively impact student success. In addition to this team, we have created a Superintendent's Advisory Council comprised of influential business leaders, community organization leaders, church leaders, local government leaders, and parents. This is a separate group from the curriculum and supervision team. Although separate groups, the two are complementary in nature.

The community council is used to create and enact a plan to energize the community and to make the community true partners with the district. Through the community council, ways in which the community can take the lead in celebrating school success are discussed and implemented. Community-based honor societies are being developed to bring attention to high achieving students. The community council also takes the lead in exploring ways to motivate parents to increase enthusiasm for the district.

Student Achievement

By the end of the 2016-2017 academic year, Barnwell School District 45 students will demonstrate academic proficiency by meeting the following targets:

- SCPASS/SC Readiness Test – The district mean of students scoring Met or exemplary will be above the state mean,
- SAT, ACT, ACT WorkKeys – The mean total score for Barnwell 45 School District students will be at or above the national average.
- AP Exams – Of the Barnwell 45 School District students taking AP exams, 65% will score 3 or above.

By the end of the 2016-2017 academic year, the on-time graduation rate for our students in each demographic subgroup will be at least 80% and will meet or exceed the state average as indicated on the district report card.

Teacher/Administrator Quality

By the end of the 2016-2017 academic school year, the number of core Academic subject area teachers who maintain highly qualified status as defined by No Child Left Behind Act will be 100%.

Student Climate

By the end of the 2016-2017 academic school year, the percentage of our students, parents, and teachers satisfied with the learning environment, physical environment, and home-school relations will increase to 95% or higher.

The following *Report to the People* is intended to inform the parents, patrons, and community supporters of Barnwell High School (BHS) about the progress made by the faculty, staff, and students toward meeting the ambitious goals that we have established. It is our belief that we will continue to improve as long as we work together with our students as our focus. We wish to provide the very best possible educational experience for your children. You are an important part of the success that we enjoy. Thank you for your valuable support.

Major Accomplishments for the 2015-2016 School Year

- Our senior class of 2015 earned right at \$3 million in scholarships.
- In 2015 fifty-six seniors earned enhanced achievement awards.
- Thirteen BHS seniors earned the President's Education Award based on PSAT scores.
- BHS continued to partner with the Southern Regional Education Board and the State Department of Education in the *High Schools that Work* initiative.
- Twenty-seven BHS students volunteered their time during the 2014-2015 school year to mentor students at the Barnwell Primary School. These mentors offer love, encouragement, and advice to help students feel better about themselves and have a greater chance to experience success in their lives.
- Seven Barnwell High Seniors were named South Carolina Palmetto Fellows for a composite total of \$187,600 (\$6700 annually for each) to attend college in South Carolina. Eligibility requirements include at least a 1200 on the SAT or 27 on the ACT, a 3.5 cumulative GPA, and a top six percent ranking in their class.
- Thirty-two students were recipients of the South Carolina four-year Life Scholarship for a composite total of \$640,000 (\$5000 annually for each) to attend a four-year college or university in South Carolina.
- Thirty-four students were awarded the South Carolina two-year Life Scholarship for a composite total of \$340,000 (\$5000 annually for each) to attend a two-year college in South Carolina.
- Fifty-one students were recipients of the South Carolina Lottery Tuition for a composite total of \$232,560.
- The graduating Class of 2015 had twenty-two honor graduates.
- Five graduating seniors received the South Carolina Academic Achievement Honors Award.
- One student received a National Merit Scholarship.
- Two girls attended Palmetto Girls State.
- Two boys attended Palmetto Boys State.
- One student received the Wendy's High School Heisman Award.
- Two students were chosen as Furman Scholars.
- One student attended the Hugh O'Brien Leadership Seminar.
- Twenty-three students were inducted into the Warhorse Chapter of the National Honor Society.
- Forty-four students were inducted into Barnwell High's Chapter of the National Beta Club.
- Twenty-one BHS Technology Student Association (TSA) students competed in South Carolina's TSA State Conference. Three of these students placed first in the state, thus earning the right to attend the national finals. Of these three students, one of them placed ninth in the nation.
- Barnwell High School's JROTC was designated as "Honor Unit with Distinction" for the twenty-third consecutive year. The Department of the Army presents this award only to the JROTC units that maintain an exceptionally high standard of performance.
- Four JROTC cadets were selected to compete in Washington, DC, at the finals of the 2015 Army JROTC Leadership Bowl Championship.
- One JROTC cadet received a four-year scholarship to the University of North Georgia.

- Three members of the JROTC Rifle Team received their varsity letter.
- Two BHS faculty members received full funding for their Donor's Choose projects.
- Walmart and the Sam's Club Community Grant Program awarded the BHS art department a \$1000 grant, and the Exxon Mobil Educational Alliance Program presented the math and science departments a \$500 grant.
- Five BHS students, all members of Boy Scout Troop 392, earned their Eagle Scout award.
- The Scarlet Knights Marching Band earned a first place rating in Class AA at the Garden City Classic in Orangeburg, South Carolina for the third consecutive year.
- The Scarlet Knights Marching Band earned an excellent rating at the Lower State Marching Contest.
- The Scarlet Knights Marching Band earned a third place rating in Class AA at the Midland Valley Competition and the Walterboro Competition.
- The Class of 2015 had nineteen scholar athletes.
- Wrestling was added to the sports program.
- Seven athletes were three-sport letterman.
- One softball player was named to the Coaches Association All-State Team.
- Three football players were named to the *High School Sports Report* All-State Football Team.
- One football player was selected to play in the North/South Football Game, and two football players were chosen to play in the Border Bowl Game.
- Three athletes were selected to All-Region teams.
- The following teams made the play-offs: football, boys and girls cross-country, volleyball, girls tennis, softball, baseball, girls soccer, boys soccer, boys tennis, track, and wrestling.
- BHS was crowned Region Champs in girls tennis, softball, baseball, and golf.
- The golf team competed in the state tournament.
- The cross-country team competed in the lower state tournament.
- Both one male tennis player and one female tennis player qualified for the individual state tournament.

Major Accomplishments for the 2015-2016 School Year

We have partnered with the SCE&G to provide an Afterschool Homework Center which serves approximately 30 students.

- > We have partnered with Edward Jones Investments and currently host Exemplary Benchmark Score Medal Ceremonies once a semester.
- > The 21st Century Dreams Program serves 75 students with an afterschool homework center daily and provides summer learning opportunities.
- > We are in a partnership with Regions Bank to provide Financial Literacy to all students.

The mission of Barnwell Primary School, in partnership with students, teachers and parents, is to develop an atmosphere of academically high standards, student-centered instruction, and positive collaboration among all stakeholders. Our ultimate goal remains to allow each child to reach his/her full potential and instill in them a lifelong love for learning.

Major Accomplishments for the 2015-2016 School Year

- We had Back-to-School Meet & Greet, Fall Carnival, Hot Dog! It's Write Night, a Student Art Show, and Book Fairs to provide our community an opportunity to visit our school.
- We are in partnership with the Save the Children Foundation to provide reading intervention for 100 students. We also have Early Steps to School Success Early Childhood Coordinators who serve 40 children ages 0-3 and 40 students through the Raising A Reader Program.
- Student award programs were held during the school year to recognize academic success, academic improvement, perfect attendance, and character education/citizenship of our students. Also, students were recognized on social media and the local newspaper.
- Students participated in music and arts programs throughout the school year. Choral performances, art shows, and drama performances were experienced by students.
- We have a very active Parent Volunteer and Mentor Program that serves students with academic and behavioral concerns.

- A 21st Century Community Learning Center Grant, which is a federally-funded program, supported an after-school program at BPS. Academic intervention and enrichment activities were offered to 100 students.
- The Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports program was continued to reduce the number of office referrals through more positive approaches to discipline. Students received rewards at the Cool Colt Corral throughout the year for good behavior.
- The school guidance counselor continued the implementation of character education and conflict resolution programs in the classrooms, one-on-one and group sessions.
- Title I Staff Development funds were used to provide on-going professional development on the implementation of the South Carolina College and Career Ready Standards. Professional development opportunities were also provided for Teaching Reading Using Technology, Bully-Free Classrooms, Differentiated Instruction, Teaching Diverse Cultures, and Using Rubrics.
- Melissa Moore was selected as the 2014-2015 BPS Teacher of the Year.


