BASIC GUIDELINES AND REQUIREMENTS FOR JOHN JAY HIGH SCHOOL CHORAL MUSIC PROGRAMS 2016-2017

RULES FOR THE MUSIC REHEARSAL AREA(S)

- -No gum chewing while in the rehearsal area. <u>DEPOSIT IT IN A WASTE BASKET AS YOU</u> ENTER!
- -Do Not operate stereo or any other electronic equipment without the permission of the teacher.
- -Please do not leave books, coats, etc. in the rehearsal area. THERE IS NEVER A GUARANTEE THAT YOU WILL BE ABLE TO RETRIEVE ANY ITEMS IF YOU LEAVE THEM LYING AROUND.
- -Use folder cabinets for folder storage. Check these folder cabinets daily for any distributed music or hand-outs. Use your folder cabinet slots to return any music. Yes, you may take your music home to practice, <u>BUT it is your responsibility to have your own music for each rehearsal.</u> It is considered to be part of your class preparation to have your own folder for rehearsals. If you do not have or use your own folder, points may be deducted from your class grade. <u>You are responsible for your music.</u> Should you lose your folder, you will be expected to pay for the music and folder. The value will be determined by the music in the folder at the time it is lost.

REHEARSAL PROCEDURES

- -You are expected to be at rehearsal on time. (Points will be deducted from your grade for lateness.)
- -Get out your music and prepare to begin rehearsal.
- -Perform stretches (where applicable) and warm-ups. Sing slow comfortable low tones. Do not yell or scream pitches. This is not musical and counter-productive.
- -When the director is ready, become silent and prepare for instructions to begin rehearsal.
- -When in doubt. . . ASK QUESTIONS! No one understands everything. When you do not understand what has been reviewed in class, whether it be requirements, musical parts or theory, ask questions. THE ONLY DUMB QUESTION IS THE ONE THAT ISN'T ASKED!!!

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

- -Take care of your voice. It is your instrument and your responsibility.
- -Bring a PENCIL to class or keep one in your folder! This is imperative for marking music parts and scores.
- -Rehearsal attendance is and ever shall be <u>mandatory</u>. This is the primary method of assessment by the director and each individual has a responsibility to the group to know their music and be prepared for performance.
- -Performances are a requirement of this course and you are expected to be in attendance.

GUIDELINES AND REQUIREMENTS - PAGE 2

Homework. It is your responsibility to know your part. This may require you to take some music home with you. Each and every one of you is considered an important and integral portion of the ensemble. If you are "fudging" a part, you are not only wasting your time, but you are wasting mine and the group's as well. You will be assessed on how well you learn your parts. . . be an aggressive participant!

Folders and Music

A Music folder and copies of all the music will be provided for you. This is school property and you are fully responsible for it. A FOLDER CABINET is located in the rehearsal area with dedicated slots for each folder. You must keep your folder in it's correct slot as there will often be music, announcements, and other communications distributed there. **It is your responsibility to have your own music for each rehearsal**. It is considered part of your class preparation to have your own folder for rehearsals. If you do not have or use your own folder, points may be deducted from your class grade. You will also be responsible for the cost of replacing any lost or damaged folders or music. You should keep a pencil in your folder at all times to mark your music – NOT INK!

LESSON ATTENDANCE is not required, but highly encouraged. We get a lot of work done during these small rehearsals and your presence is requested. Attendance at lesson periods can add as much as 5% to your grade.

PERFORMANCES ARE REQUIRED! This is a PERFORMANCE ENSEMBLE CLASS.

Please be responsible and check the schedule. <u>Each and every one of you</u> is important to the performance. If you are not in attendance, YOU ARE MISSED! There are a few acceptable reasons for not attending a performance. All absences pre-approved or otherwise <u>must be explained by parent or guardian in writing</u>. In the event a student cannot attend a performance, he/she may be asked to complete an alternative assignment or performance. This assignment/performance will be given grading weight equivalent to a similar portion of the performance rating had he/she attended.

Each student is required to provide their own concert attire as follows:

CONCERT CHOIR -

Ladies: **LONG** black skirt (black pants are acceptable), white blouse, black shoes Gentlemen: White shirt, Black tie, Black pants (NO JEANS!), Black shoes (NO SNEAKERS!) CHORALE –

We are moving to formal concert attire this year. Information on dresses and tuxedo measuring and purchase will be handed out the beginning of the year in class.

Extra credit for music-related activities outside the school curriculum may be considered by the Director on an individual basis.

GRADING POLICY

There are several factors considered when formulating a grade for the student. These are as follows:

CONCERT CHOIR

Student classroom participation (includes attendance)	50%
Student performances	30%
Sight Singing and Rhythm Reading	10%
General music symbol understanding	10%
Lesson attendance (not required)	(+ up to 5%)

CHORALE

Student classroom participation (includes attendance)	50%
Student performances	30%
Sight Singing and Rhythm Reading	10%
General music symbol understanding	10%
Lesson attendance (not required)	(+ up to 5%)

Some important musical factors in all aspects of grading are:

Punctuality (being at rehearsal and set up on time)

Posture (sitting in a correct singing position that supports good tone)

Attention (not talking and listening to the Conductor to receive feedback and instruction) **Musicality** (making each effort one based on achieving the most musical of results)

Commitment, responsibility, preparation, and behavior are all factors considered with some or all of the above grading components.

OTHER PERFORMANCE OPPORTUNITIES

The program offers many other small ensemble performance opportunities for students enrolled in Concert Choir and Chorale. Below are outlined some of those ensembles.

<u>NYSSMA Ensemble</u> - This group is formed by invitation for the primary purpose of performing at the NYSSMA Small Ensemble Festival in the Spring. There are usually 12-16 members and the group meets for six to eight weeks outside the regular curriculum.

NYSSMA Solo Festival - This Festival is held each spring and is the audition vehicle for students desiring to participate in the New York All State Chorus. It can also be a valuable learning experience for all singers in the adjudication provided by the judges. The solos are taken from a required list provided by the Choral Studies Director. It is the student's responsibility to select a solo, secure the music, prepare the solo, secure an accompanist, schedule rehearsals and provide transportation to and from the festival site. There is a fee involved, which is due at the time of registration. YOU MUST BE A MEMBER OF THE SCHOOL CHORAL STUDIES PROGRAM IN ORDER TO PARTICIPATE IN ANY NYSSMA EVENT.

GUIDELINES AND REQUIREMENTS - PAGE 4

John Jay Vocal Jazz - This ensemble is formed at the beginning of the year with scheduled rehearsals determined by the director. The group meets outside the regular ensemble periods, performs in school concerts, and is available to all students enrolled in John Jay HS. Tehearsals are scheduled by the director and are mandatory. This group participates in school concerts and completes each year in the Berklee High School Jazz Festival in Boston, MA.

<u>Noteables</u> - This is an all female, student-run ensemble that meets outside the regular school day. While the group is not part of the music program, they do occasionally perform at school concerts. It is available to all female students enrolled in John Jay High School and is auditioned in late spring for the following year.

<u>The Rolling Tones</u> – This is an all male a cappella that meets out side of the school day. Like the Noteables, it is student run and they do perform at various school functions. This group is open to all students enrolled at JJHS. Auditions are usually held in the late spring for the following year.

<u>The TrebleMakers</u>— This is a mixed voice, student—run ensemble that meets out side of the school day. They perform at various school functions and auditions are usually held in the late spring for the following year. This group is open to all students enrolled at JJHS.
