Dear Parents,




To encourage these journeys, we are providing reading lists of suggested titles to guide students in their reading choices. Please refer to the appropriate list for your child by grade level. These lists were compiled for students in Pelham Middle School by the classroom teachers, the library media specialist, and the Pelham Public Library. Our goal is for students to read during the summer as a recreational and pleasurable activity. We believe that summer reading is critical to our students' overall development and should be a joint responsibility of the school and home.

All middle school students should read a minimum of **three** books. These books may, but do not have to, come from the suggested reading list. We encourage you to assist your child in fulfilling this requirement. Browsing titles at the Pelham Public Library or at a local bookstore is an opportunity to support good reading choices. Please keep in mind that many young adult books deal with sensitive or more mature themes or content. Therefore, previewing the books before your child begins to read is suggested. **At the end of the summer, each student should complete the form on the last page of the reading list. This form asks for a list of the three books that your child chose to read along with a parent or guardian signature. These forms will be collected during the first week of school in September.**




Anything But Typical – Nora Raleigh Baskin

April Morning – Howard Fast

The American Revolution leaps to life in this unforgotten account of the Battle of Lexington. It is also the story of a father and son who are at odds. (Historical Fiction)




Ball Don't Lie – Matt De La Pena

A teenager (Grayson Boucher) uses basketball to overcome his emotional scars and obsessive-compulsive personality disorder. (Sports/Realistic Fiction)




Bar Code Tattoo - Suzanne Weyn


Black and White – Paul Volponi


Divergent - Veronica Roth

In Beatrice Prior's dystopian Chicago world, society is divided into five factions, each dedicated to the cultivation of a particular virtue—Candor (the honest), Abnegation (the selfless), Dauntless (the brave), Amity (the peaceful), and Erudite (the intelligent). On an appointed day of every year, all sixteen-year-olds must select the faction to which they will devote the rest of their lives. (Science Fiction/Adventure)




Drums, Girls and Dangerous Pie -Jordan Sonnenblick


Heat - Mike Lupica


Hero - Mike Lupica


Hoops - Walter Dean Myers


Hunger Games - Suzanne Collins


I am Malala - Malala Yousafzai, co-written by Patricia McCormick


If I Stay - Gayle Forman


Kira-Kira - Cynthia Kadohata

A meteor hits the moon and in one moment the whole world changes. Food and heat are almost nonexistent. One girl journals her family's desperate struggle for survival. (Science Fiction)



Little Bee – Chris Cleave

What happens on the beach is brutal, and it braids the fates of a 16-year-old Nigerian orphan (who calls herself Little Bee) and a well-off British couple --- journalists who are trying to repair their strained marriage with a free holiday, and who should have stayed behind their resort's walls. (Fiction)




Maximum Ride - James Patterson

Fourteen-year-old Maximum Ride, better known as Max, knows what it's like to soar above the world. She and all the members of the "flock" --- Fang, Iggy, Nudge, Gasman and Angel --- are just like ordinary kids - ordinary kids who have wings and can fly. 
Murder on the Orient Express - Agatha Christie

An unpopular billionaire is murdered on board a famous train and everyone on board is a suspect. (Fiction/Mystery)




My Sister's Keeper - Jodi Picoult


Paper Towns - John Green


Perks of Being a Wallflower - Stephen Chbosky


Speak - Laurie Halse Anderson

This is the story of what happens to a girl who is ostracized by her peers after busting an end-of-summer party. (Fiction)




Temple Grandin: How the Girl who loved cows embraced Autism and changed the world - Temple Grandin

This biography explores the life and mind of Temple Grandin, a brilliant autistic woman who revolutionized the livestock industry. (Non-Fiction/Biography)




That Summer - Sarah Dessen


The Boy in the Striped Pajamas - John Boyne


The Boy Who Dared - Susan Campbell Bartoletti

In jail awaiting his execution, a German teenager recalls Hitler's rise to power and the courage he found to stand up against the Nazi regime. (Historical Fiction)




The Crossover - Kwame Alexander

14-year-old twin basketball stars wrestle with highs and lows on and off the court as their father ignores his declining health. (Sports/Realistic Fiction/Verse)




The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night - Mark Haddon


The Five People You Meet in Heaven - Mitch Albom


The Giver - Lois Lowry

Boy receives memories with emotions that don't exist in his society, and discovers the truth about his community. (Utopian/Dystopian/Fiction)




The Great Greene Heist - Varian Johnson


The Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy - Douglas Adams

Track star Jessica loses a leg in a terrible car accident. Her road to recovery is a long one, but she can't give up her dream of running again. (Realistic Fiction)

When Ruth Ann (Roo) McCabe responds to a text message while she's driving, her life as she knows it ends.
