TECHNOLOGY AND LEARNING

Technology is used throughout our school to enhance instruction for the students, to provide differentiated curriculum and to help students better understand Common Core concepts. Students use the computers on a regular basis in their classrooms and teachers prepare interactive lessons for use on their white boards or in the computer labs. Each teacher has a website where students and parents can view classroom information. We have a variety of online tools available to us and are able to share in many ways including blogs, wikis, video-conferencing, and using the collaborative tools in Google Applications.

As part of our curriculum, we educate our students about Digital Citizenship, including Internet Safety, Communicating in an Online Community, Respecting the Work of Others, and Researching Online. Students will be participating in activities to help them to understand about the rights and responsibilities of being an online learner. All students are required to read and sign an Acceptable Use Policy and we ask that parents review this policy with your child to help them understand what it means for them. Computer activities, online applications and resources are a part of many lessons, the goal being to support the objectives of the Common Core Standards and to increase student achievement. Students may be asked to complete online work at home. They can also complete work during our afterschool extra-help period and should make arrangements with the classroom teacher.

NO COST FUND RAISERS

E.S.S.A. -Every Student Succeeds Act

E.S.S.A. is a United States Law passed in December 2015, that governs the U.S. K-12 Public Education Policy across the country.

The State/Federal Government is presently using PARCC tests in grades 3 to 8, and N.J.S.L.A-5 Science, for grades 5 and 8.

PRE-KINDERGARTEN

The four-year-old Pre-Kindergarten a.m. program will be from 8:35-11:10 a.m. and the afternoon program will be from 12:25-3:00 p.m. A certified teacher and aide will be working with the children. To be eligible for this tuition-based program, the child must be four years old by October 1st. If you desire further information, please contact the Principal's Office.

DISABLED STUDENTS-AGES 3-21

The Board recognizes the statutory right of any handicapped child between the ages of 3 and 21 who resides in the school district to a free public education. Ninety days before children reach their 3rd birthday, they are eligible for evaluation and possible placement in a pre-school handicapped program upon written request from the parents or guardian. Children classified as pre-school handicapped shall be recommended for placement in an appropriate program. All other provisions of NJAC 6A:14.1.1, which guarantee the rights of handicapped pupils, shall apply to the 3 to 21 year old handicapped student population. DISCRIMINATION

Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 protects students from discrimination based on sex in educational programs or activities which receive Federal financial assistance. New Jersey Administrative Code 6:4, in addition, prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color, creed, religion, sex, ancestry, national origin, or social or economic status. The Board of Education hereby designates Ms. Diana Silva, as Affirmative Action Officer, to coordinate compliance efforts and to investigate any complaints of discrimination in the district. The Carlstadt Board of Education has policies prohibiting bias, harassment, discrimination and segregation, and ensuring equality in educational programs.

WORK WITH THE TEACHER FIRST IF YOU ENCOUNTER A DISAGREEMENT...

Don't like homework assignments? Don't think the teacher has been fair to your child? Think her approach to teaching isn't working?

There are others at school that can help you resolve a problem with your child's teacher – the school counselor or principal. But the first person you should always talk to is the teacher. Following these steps can help resolve a problem quickly:

- Set up an appointment.** Or contact the teacher by phone. The end of the day, when you're both tired, is probably not the best time for a discussion involving strong feelings.
- Seek the facts.** Talk to your child. But try not to draw conclusions or assess blame until you've talked with the teacher.
- Look for misunderstanding.** Sometimes the teacher isn't aware of a child's difficulty or confusion about a rule or assignment. Or your child might misunderstand an assignment.
- Avoid criticizing** the teacher or school in front of your child. This confuses children, and might make them become defiant and rude to teachers.
- Discuss possible solutions.** What might you, the teacher, and your child do to solve the problem at hand?
- Talk about** how best to proceed. Try to work something out with the teacher. But if you can't agree on a solution, discuss who you will talk to next.

READY TO LEARN

Setting up routines

Tom and Rick are close friends with similar abilities. Tom does well in school, but Rick struggles. He often seems tired and misses assignments.

Why the difference? One reason is that Tom's family establishes daily routines to help him do his best. Consider the routines below to make your child feel more...

Relaxed. Music can help your child avoid the morning rush. Play a soothing tape and ask him to be dressed and ready by the time it's over. *Tip:* On Sundays, have him put each day's outfit for the coming week on hangers labeled Monday through Friday.

Energized. A good breakfast increases concentration. Offer your youngster healthy choices. *Examples:* a whole-wheat bagel with peanut butter; orange juice blended with fruit and yogurt; instant oatmeal.

Connected. Talking about the school day lets your child know you care: Ask him to share two good things that happened during the day. Prompt him with specific questions, such as "Which multiplication tables did you practice?"

Rested. A set bedtime helps kids fall asleep more quickly. Suggest that your child get in bed 15 minutes early to read, make up stories, or talk quietly with you.

FOR THE LOVE OF READING

What's the best way to create a lifelong reader? *Answer:* Reading together. Reading is free, fun, and will bring you and your child closer. Find a time each day when you and your youngster can get cozy and enjoy a good book.

Here are three tips to help you choose stories:

1. Ask librarians, friends, and teachers for recommendations. *Tip:* If your child doesn't already have a library card, sign him/ her up!

2. Find books that expand your youngster's interests (insects, outer space), deal with an event (a new baby, a visit to the dentist), and build character (friendship, truthfulness).

3. Pick stories for both information and enjoyment. Try real and make-believe stories and poems as well as children's magazines.

STUDENT REGISTRATION
