Internship & Job Opportunities for High School Students in NYC

NEW YORK CITYWIDE PROGRAMS

Program Title: Ladders for Leaders

Host Agency: Department of Youth & Community Development

Program Dates: The program typically starts the first week in July and participants work 25-40 hours per week for a minimum of 6 weeks. Many employers have extended offers to their interns to continue on past the 6 weeks.

Financial Support: Paid by the employer

Eligibility Requirements: Ages 16-22; resident of one of the five NYC boroughs; must be enrolled in high school or college; minimum GPA of 3.00; have some prior paid work or volunteer experience

Application Materials: Online application; working papers

Application Deadline: March 1st, 2019

Program Summary: The NYC Ladders for Leaders program, a component of the Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP), provides professional internships to NYC youth between the ages of 16 to 22. This competitive process differs from the traditional SYEP model in that it requires applicants to submit an application to one of several community-based organizations (CBO) serving the five boroughs. Applications are evaluated based on academic performance, response to an essay question, and resume. Once participants have been selected, they are engaged in 30-hours of pre-employment training designed to teach essential workplace readiness skills and business etiquette. Interviews for summer internships are scheduled by our partnering CBO's in a variety of industries from the public and private sectors. Final selections for the six-week internship are made by our partnering employers.

Program Title: Department of Labor NY Youth Jobs Program

Financial Support: Paid by employer

Eligibility Requirements: Ages 16-24 and already unemployed, NYS resident, meet at least one of the criteria list on website

(* **16 and 17 YEARS OLD** MUST be in school or attending classes to earn their high school equivalency diploma AND need permission from a parent or guardian)

Application Materials: Online application

Program Title: New York City Department of Design and Construction High School Summer Internship Program

Financial Support: Paid program

Eligibility Requirements: NYC resident; NYC high school students ages 16+; working papers; available for the *entire* duration of the program (**Ages 14 and 15*** only considered if they have previously participated in past DDC programs or workshop events)

Application Materials: DDC High School Summer Internship application, current resume, DYCD Ladders for Leaders and/or Summer Youth Employment Program application and school transcript

Application Deadline: March 4th, 2019

Program summary: During the summer of 2019 the New York City Department of Design and Construction (DDC), in partnership with the NYC Department of Youth and Community Development (NYC DYCD), will offer a summer internship for forty (40) talented NYC high school students to work full-time in house at New York City Department of Design and Construction.

The High School Summer Internship Program is designed for students interested in pursuing careers in architecture, engineering, building trades, public administration, business administration or information technology. The program is structured to enable students to gain exposure to the many careers in the built environment and to learn about what it takes to build NYC. It is a unique opportunity to prepare students for the growing demands of the job market.

Assignments may include AutoCAD (computer aided design) drafting for students interested in architecture or engineering, internet research, word processing, spreadsheet creation, and other clerical work. Students work five days a week for six weeks, from Monday July 8th to Friday August 16th, 2019.

COLLEGE PREP & ACADEMIC SUPPORT

Program Title: NYU College Access Leadership Institute (CALI)

Program Dates: July 15 - 20, 2018

Eligibility: 10th & 11th grade

Application Materials: Online Application, Activities List/Resume, Two Essays, Two Recommendation Letters, PSAT, SAT, **OR** ACT test scores (**note:** if you have not taken any of these exams, you may still apply to NYU CALI)

Application Deadline: April 16th, 2019

Program Summary: This program will include workshops and small group sessions on a variety of topics including college admissions, college entrance test preparation, essay and resume writing, interviewing and presentation skills and financial aid literacy. Program graduates will be certified College Access Ambassadors and will be required to act as mentors and advisers in their respective high schools by conducting their very own college application workshop.

Successful applicants to the NYU CALI program come from underrepresented communities and are academically strong high school students from the New York metro/tri-state area. They also demonstrate exceptional leadership abilities within their schools and communities. If selected, students are awarded a full scholarship to the institute, and they are only expected to cover travel expenses to and from the NYU campus. Fee waivers are available for NYU Applications should students decide to apply to NYU for university.

Program Summary: Carleton College is honored to host an inspiring summer program designed for the best and brightest college-bound students representing high schools across the country. The Carleton Liberal Arts Experience (CLAE) will select 52 high school students who have just completed their sophomore year and bring them to Carleton, all expenses paid, for a one-week summer program. Program Title: BridgeUP Mentorship

Host Organization: New York Public Library, locations in Manhattan and the Bronx

Program Cost: Free

Eligibility: 9th grade through high school graduation

Program Dates: Summer dates vary by location. Attendance is required at least 2 days per week (for 10th thru 12th graders).

Application Materials: Application, essay, teacher recommendation and interview

Application Deadline: ASAP

Program Summary: BridgeUP is the New York Public Library's innovative mentorship program that supports NYC teens reach their academic and developmental potential. From the 9th grade through high school graduation, BridgeUP provides its students with long-term mentorship, daily academic support, and access to engaging learning opportunities that foster academic independence, critical thinking, collaboration, and creativity. The four-year program offers services to over 250 New York City ninth to 12th graders each year at multiple New York Public Library locations in underserved neighborhoods in the Bronx and Manhattan. These students work together in groups of 10 over a five year period, with the end goal to attend college or technical school. The program works in low-income neighborhoods, providing a safe space for participants during after school hours.

For the 2018-2019 school year, BridgeUP sites are located at 96th Street Library and Countee Cullen Library in Manhattan, and Allerton Library and Bronx Library Center in the Bronx. These sites are generally open Monday through Thursday between 3 pm and 7 pm. Schedules will vary across sites, so please contact the BridgeUP staff member located on the New York Public Library BridgeUP website.

LAW & CRIMINAL JUSTICE

Program Title: New York County District Attorney's Office High School Summer Internship Program

Eligibility: Applicants must live in Manhattan or attend school in Manhattan, 10th, 11th, and 12th grade

Application Materials: One page resume, 300-word essay and letter of recommendation

Internship Dates: Applicants must commit to attend the entire program from July 8th, 2019 - August 9th, 2019, Monday - Friday from 9:00 AM - 4:30 PM (students will not be permitted to start after July 8th or leave before August 9th)

Financial Support: \$175 weekly stipend

Application Deadline: Applications will be accepted online only starting February 11th, 2019 through March 11th, 2019 at 11:59pm

Program Summary: Students will participate in a six week, paid opportunity that will expose them to many aspects of the criminal justice system. Each intern will be assigned to a unit in the District Attorney's office and help Assistant District Attorneys and other staff members with their work. Interns will also have the opportunity to attend presentations and trips and participate in a mock trial competition.

Applicants must live in Manhattan or attend school in Manhattan (****no exceptions will be made).

Students will attend classroom sessions with lectures, roleplays and topical demonstrations by police officers in the areas of law, behavioral science, drug prevention and gang resistance.

Program Summary: The FDNY Exploring Program is part of the Greater New York Councils Exploring Program. The Exploring Program gives New Yorkers between the ages of 14 to 20 the opportunity to gain valuable insight into a career at the Fire Department, while simultaneously building plans for their futures. The innovative program helps participants gain work experience and assistance with educational and fitness requirements that are critical to successfully pursuing a career at the FDNY. Participants also develop contacts with FDNY Firefighters, EMTs, Paramedics and others already on the job.

Applicants must also provide proof of ability to maintain satisfactory GPA, provide a doctor's letter of good health, and must be able to attend **four** meetings per month. An annual fee of \$15 is required to cover liability insurance and administrative fees.

STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) & HEALTH

Program Title: Applied Research Innovations in Science and Engineering (ARISE)

Host College/University: NYU Tandon School of Engineering

Program Dates: Full time - approximately a 9 to 5 day (with one 9 to 6 day) Monday-Friday, from July 1st, 2019 to August 16th, 2019 and an orientation on Friday, June 28, 2019 from 9am-1pm.

Financial Support: \$500 stipend

Eligibility Requirements: Applicants must be residents of the City of New York (**must live in one of the five boroughs**) and will be completing 10th or 11th grade in June 2019

Application Materials: Online application (including transcript, one support letter, an essay, and a designated research area of interest)

Application Deadline: March 3rd, 2019

Program Summary: After a successful launch in summer 2013, the NYU Tandon School of Engineering continues to conduct the ARISE program. This selective program is for academically strong, current 10th and 11th grade New York City students with a demonstrated interest in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM).

This full-time, seven week program includes: College level workshops and seminars, a high level research experience in participating NYU faculty labs, and mentoring in that placement by a graduate or postdoctoral student. In the seminars and workshops, students will be introduced to the scientific method and ethics, data collection and analysis, research practices and lab safety. Students will also receive hands-on experience in labs, as well as training in presentation and public speaking.

Approximately 48 placements are available for the summer of 2019.

Program Title: Computer Science for Cyber Security (CS4CS) Summer Program for High School Women

Host University: New York University

Dates: July 8th to July 26th, 2019; 9 am to 3 pm daily

Eligibility: Young women in grades 9-12

Application Materials: Online application; unofficial **or** official transcript

Application Due: April 10th, 2019

Program Summary: A **free**, three-week, full-day summer program providing an introduction for high school women on the fundamentals of cyber security and computer science at the NYU Tandon School of Engineering. No background or experience in cyber security or computer programming is needed in order to apply, only your interest and enthusiasm. The program is led by members of the Department of Computer Science and Engineering and the Offensive Security, Incident Response and Internet Security (OSIRIS) Laboratory.

Housing, transportation, and meals are not provided. Participants should live year-round in New York City or in small neighboring cities such as Newark, Hempstead, or Jersey City.

Program Title: High School Initiative in Remote Sensing of the Earth Systems Science & Engineering (HIRES)

Host College/University: City University of New York

Program Dates: Spring Semester-Summer (Dates vary by University site)

Financial Support: \$800 stipend and 3 college credits

Application Materials: Official application (personal statement/statement of interest); Regents, PSAT, or SAT scores; letter of recommendation from a teacher; high school transcript

Eligibility Requirements:

- Applications must be New York City residents
- Applicants should be academically strong, highly motivated students
- Applicants with a passion for science, technology, engineering, and math
- Responsible students who have demonstrated: an ability to make and fulfill commitments, timeliness, and persistence
- Students who are currently enrolled in (or have completed) algebra 2/trigonometry or pre-calculus

Application Deadline: March 2019 (Key dates for interviews and laboratory tours follow)

Program Summary: HIRES provides an advanced STEM research opportunity to New York City students with little or no access to high quality STEM education experiences. Students from demographic groups traditionally underrepresented in STEM disciplines and careers, including women, students of color and those from low income backgrounds, are strongly encouraged to apply.

The 7-week program (July through August), integrates pre-college credit courses (computer analysis; GIS and Remote Sensing – 3 credits); hands-on research; along with learning modules in Earth Sciences and Engineering (ESE). Students participate in field trips during course of the program, and present their research at end of the summer program at CUNY STEM Summer Research Symposium.

Up to 25 placements are available for the summer program. Applications for 2019 open in January with the submission deadline scheduled for sometime during March.

Program Title: Brown Scholars Program

Host Museum: American Museum of Natural History

Program Dates: 2 days a week Mondays and Wednesdays 4:30-6:30 pm from late September-June; 5 days a week, 10 am-3 pm for 6 weeks from July to August

Financial Support: Tuition-free

Eligibility: 9th and 10th grade girls may apply

Application Materials: an online application including short essay questions, one letter of recommendation from a teacher or adult, a copy of your most recent transcript/report card.

Program Summary: The Brown Scholars program is a 2-plus year intensive focused on the intersection of computer science and science **for high school girls**. This program offers an introduction to programming

and is intended for students who have limited access to coding classes/resources. It is completely tuition-free.

A 9-month paid internship in computational research within a scientific division at AMNH is offered to those who complete the 120 hours of coursework during the school year and the summer months. This internship allows scholars to work in a team of 6 of their Brown peers under a mentorship. Internships will run for two afternoons a week: Tuesdays and Thursdays from 4:30-6:30 pm during the months of September to June. They will end with presentations.

Program Summary: The Summer Immersion Program is an introductory Computer Science course, and no previous experience is required. We welcome all eligible applicants who have an interest in technology and a willingness to learn! Those who are of underrepresented backgrounds, have little to no access or exposure to computer science education in school, and who are eligible for Free and Reduced Lunch are especially encouraged to apply.

Each week of the program covers projects related to computer science, such as art, storytelling, robotics, video games, websites, and apps. Participants will gain exposure to languages such as Scratch, Python, Arduino C, HTML, CSS, and JavaScript. You'll also hear from guest speakers, participate in workshops, connect with female engineers and entrepreneurs, and go on field trips. The program culminates in a final project where participants build their own product and share it with their class.

Program Summary: PUSJP is one of the country's most innovative and successful programs working to provide opportunities to outstanding high school students from low-income backgrounds. We welcome about 40 high school students from low-income backgrounds every summer to Princeton's campus for an all-expenses-paid, intensive 10-day seminar on journalism. The program's goal is to diversify college and professional newsrooms by encouraging outstanding students from low-income backgrounds to pursue careers in journalism. All expenses, including students' travel costs to and from Princeton, are paid for by

the program. Classes at the program are taught by reporters and editors from The New York Times, The Washington Post, The New Yorker, National Journal, New York Magazine, The Daily Beast, Time Magazine, ESPN the Magazine, CNN and NPR, among other media outlets. Students tour The New York Times, The Daily Beast and Time Magazine; conduct an investigative project; cover a professional sports event; cover news events in the Princeton area; film and produce TV segments; and report, write, edit and design their own newspaper, [The Princeton Summer Journal](#). Students attend seminars on every aspect of the college admissions process and take a practice SAT or ACT. Program Summary: DOROT chooses up to twenty interns for each session, and these interns are expected to volunteer with the organization during the school year. Each morning interns gather together at DOROT for their daily assignments. The first day of each session will include an orientation and training. On Thursdays the interns gather for lunch, group reflection and occasional guest speakers. The internship provides supervision and coaching, snacks and program supplies, and a letter of completion and college recommendation. **Interns can only participate in one session for the summer.**

Some intern responsibilities include: visiting seniors in their home for companionship; teaching seniors how to use a computer, iPad, iShuffle, and other types of technology; celebrating seniors' birthdays; delivering meals to seniors; sending birthday cards out to seniors; reading to visually impaired seniors; shopping and delivering groceries to seniors; playing chess, cards, Scrabble, and other games with seniors; assisting with office work at DOROT; assisting in planning, running and implementing an intergenerational game day or museum trip; and visiting DOROT's Homelessness Prevention Program and taking part in cooking a meal for the seniors who live in our transitional housing facility. Each session will provide interns to engage with social justice either in the context of their Jewish roots or through an intergenerational class.

Program Title: Teen Career Connection (TCC)

Host Organization: West Side YMCA

Program Summary: During the months of July and August, the participants complete an eight-week internship program. YMCA Staff members match the teens with the participating host sites based on their interests and qualifications. We also provide each teen with an adult mentor that checks in with the student throughout the training and placement. There are mentor and mentee team-building outings planned during the eight week program.

Participants are required to be available for the following dates for group/individual interviews, orientations, and trainings: March 13-20, March 25-April 5, June 1&5, and June 24-July 5. For the next six weeks the teens spend at least 35 hours per week in their jobs. They are expected to report back to the Y each week with reflection assignments. West Side YMCA staff visits each site during the internship period to get feedback from the teens' supervisor.
