## Free eBooks with Zing



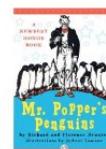
Zing, provided by Schoolwide, is a platform that offers over a thousand free fiction and nonfiction ebooks to students and teachers. Books are predominantly in English, but Spanish titles are available too! One of the best features—the ebooks offer unlimited, simultaneous access. Ebooks, which are accessible anywhere there's internet access, can be used on laptops, desktops, interactive whiteboards and tablets.

Zing organizes titles by genres. Users also have the ability to search and filter

by guided reading level, lexile, theme, topic, etc. Another key feature of Zing, it also boasts eReader tools. Some examples include: note taking, highlighting, bookmarks, and an interactive dictionary.

Educators have the option to create a class and manage accounts for students. Reading logs can also be monitored. After reading user feedback, it was noted that the classroom setup process can be somewhat time intensive and that there is room for improvement in that area.

Overall, Zing shows much potential and clearly offers another vehicle to promote reading. Consider sharing this with elementary and middle school students to promote reading over the summer months, when students don't have access to a school library. a research-based contest, the final student product should answer a research question. It is also recommended that students work with teachers, library media specialists, local historians, etc.

A total of three awards will be given, one from each division: Grades 4-5, 6-8 and 9-12.

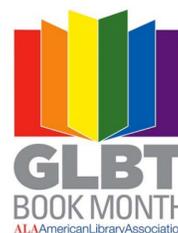

## EasyBib is Now Free!

### EasyBib a Chegg<sup>®</sup> service

Chegg Inc., which recently acquired Imagine Easy Solutions, is now offering EasyBib for schools, for free! While the current EasyBib version is free, a new and more robust version of EasyBib is currently in the works. Once the new version is complete, it too will be offered at no cost.

EasyBib is a bibliography and note-taking tool that creates citations in MLA (a new 8th edition is coming this summer), APA, and Chicago styles. It is a great tool to teach students how to accurately credit sources. Credit-

ing sources goes beyond teaching students how to avoid plagiarism, but it demonstrates a knowledge of how to properly research and also allows the reader to accurately access resources used during the research process.

EasyBib includes a notebook feature, which enables students to organize their notes. In addition, there is a new information literacy tool that teaches students to critically evaluate websites. Other features that are arriving soon include an annotation tool to help students find important information, and an improved Google Docs add-on with notes and out-

line support to help students throughout the writing process.

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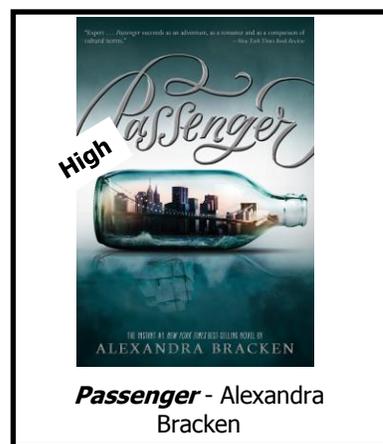
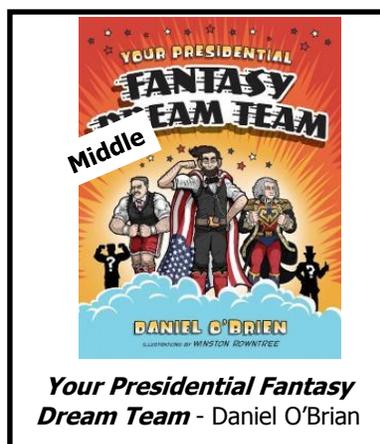
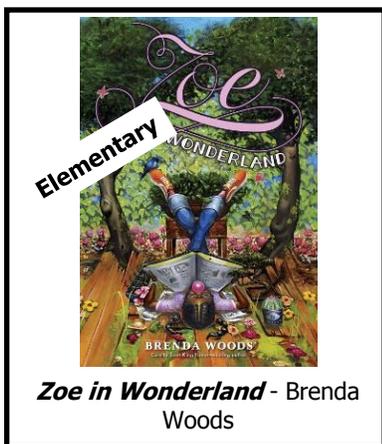
